

Beloved in Christ,

As you read this article, we are approaching the mid-point of Great Lent. If we have been slow in getting into a Lenten frame of mind, then let us stop and reflect on where we are on this annual, spiritual journey called *Great Lent*. To aid this, allow me to review the Lenten season up to now, and to speak about what we should anticipate in the next few weeks.

First of all, let us look back at the three preliminary weeks that prepared us for the coming of Great Lent. This period contains four Sundays of Scripture readings and hymns, which clearly remind us of the major themes during the coming Fast. The first two Sundays were dedicated to the parables of the Publican and the Pharisee and that of the Prodigal Son, respectively. With both of these parables, we are reminded of the centrality of humility and repentance that should be everpresent in the lives of Orthodox Christians. Secondly, we are reminded of God's unending mercy and forgiveness to those who sincerely repent, and who truly seek God in their lives.

The third Sunday of the pre-Lenten period is a poignant reminder of the second coming of Christ and our preparedness for that awesome event, according to how we live our lives in relationship to God and each other. The final Sunday before Lent begins, is known as the Sunday of Forgiveness, on which we also commemorate the expulsion of Adam from Paradise. On this day, we remember that our Lenten experience will be fruitless if we cannot enter it with a humbled and forgiving heart. Secondly, we remember that we are part of fallen humanity seeking to regain Paradise along with the first-formed man and woman. During Great Lent, we become Old Testament "wanderers," seeking salvation through our Redeemer Christ, which came through His awesome Passion, Death and Resurrection.

As we took leave of the three-week

preparatory period and entered into Great Lent proper, we should have entered with joy and eagerness, even in the face of the rigorous fasting and frequent services. In fact, after the first and most intense week of Great Lent, the following Sunday is a joyous feast. On the Sunday of Orthodoxy, we celebrate the final triumph of Orthodoxy against heresies, specifically through the restoration of the holy icons. It is a day for us to remember, among other things, that we, too, are icons of God, having been created in His image and likeness. This day helps us truly see the need to cleanse ourselves through our Lenten journey, in order to be worthy icons of God.

Another celebratory Sunday in Lent, is that of the veneration of the Holy Cross. If we haven't made much of a Lenten effort by that Sunday, which is the mid-point of the Fast, it is now high time to pick up our cross and follow the Lord to His death and resurrection. For those who have been diligently following a Lenten lifestyle, the feast of the Cross is a place of rest and a time for refreshment, to assist us in completing our ascetic struggle which leads to Golgotha and the Holy Sepulcher.

It is imperative to remember, however, that the true *telos* – the goal, the fulfillment of Great Lent, is repent*ance.* The preparation for the coming of Lent, the fasting, our intensified praying, the extra services, our charitable acts – all these things together, when fully practiced and understood, bring us to tears of repentance and the saving act of Holy Confession. However, when we insist, for whatever reason, to go year after year without truly repenting and confessing, then please know that such an observance of Lent is not complete, no matter how much effort is put into any one or more of the components mentioned above.

When we were students, did we try our best to complete all our assignments and study diligently for exams, but then *not* show up to take them? Or, did we do what was expected of



us so that we could progress? When we see our physician in times of sickness, after being examined and receiving his/ her counsel and a prescription, do we stay away from the pharmacy saying, "I'm fine – I don't need the medicine?" Or, do we take the medication in order to restore our body to a healthy state?

To help us achieve reaping the fruit of repentance during Lent, our Holy Church presents us with a most exemplary model of repentance on the fifth Sunday of the Fast – *St. Mary of Egypt.* If we've never fully read her life, we should make it a point to do so this Lent. Her story will move us to tears – hopefully, tears of repentance that will lead us to church for the cleansing of our soul, prior to celebrating Holy Pascha.

Therefore, beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, let us see where we stand so far this Lent, and resolve to make the necessary adjustments in order to remain on the straight and narrow path. The true inner joy found in the celebration of the Resurrection of Christ, can only come after the tears and inner sorrow found during the saving time of Great Lent. May you all have a most blessed remainder of Lent, and a most joyous Holy Pascha!

Lenten Fasting Guidelines

Following are the traditional fasting guidelines in their full form as a starting point. Obviously, many will need to follow a reduced manner of fasting due to health, pregnancy, nursing, or other hardships, as well as for growing children. In addition, consideration should be applied in the case of interfaith marriages. As your spiritual father, I am always available for guidance.

Weekdays of Lent

• Strict fast from all animal products including fish (shellfish permitted), wine (all alcoholic beverages), and olive oil (vegetable/seed oil permitted).

Weekends of Lent

• Relaxed fast – olive oil, wine (all alcoholic beverages), and shellfish permitted (not fish).

Holy Week

- Palm Sunday (4/28) fish, wine, and olive oil permitted.
- Holy Monday through and including Holy Saturday strict fast as on weekdays of Lent.

Note: On weekdays we attempt to reduce the quantity of food consumed. On weekends there is no limit on food consumed.

<u>Spiritual Wisdom</u>

This is the great work of a man: always to take blame for his own sins before God and to expect temptation to his last breath. (St. Anthony the Great)

Let us cast away, let us reject all things, let us bid farewell to all things – to all relationships, actions, and intentions that drag us downward, separate us from God and produce such a death. (St. Gregory Palamas)

If an earthly king wrote you a letter, would you not read it with joy? Certainly, with great rejoicing and careful attention. The King of heaven has sent a letter to you, an earthly and mortal man; yet you almost despise such a gift, so priceless a treasure. Whenever you read the Gospel, Christ Himself is speaking to you. And while you read, you are praying and talking with Him. (St. Tikhon of Zadonsk)

He who says that he loves the Lord but is angry with his brother is like a man who dreams that he is running. (St. John Climacus)

The Myrrh-bearing women didn't worry about anything because they were in a spiritual state, and placed their trust in Christ. If they had not been in a spiritual state, what would they have trusted in to do what they did? In the spiritual life, even the most cowardly person can acquire real bravery if he places his trust in Christ – in divine help. Such a person can go to the front line and fight a war and win. (St. Paisios the Athonite)

Holy Confession During Great Lent

- After all weekday evening services, except Wednesday Presanctified Liturgies
- After Great Vespers on Saturday evenings (all year)
- During office hours by appointment (all year)

Great Lent is the season of the liturgical year that is focused on repentance. Besides our fasting, charitable works, and church attendance, let us reap the benefits of the Fast by being cleansed through the holy sacrament of Confession. This way, we can fully celebrate Holy Pascha with a clean and pure heart and soul!

If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us. (I John 1:8-10)

Meetings During Lent

During Great Lent, let us all plan accordingly for ministry meetings as follows:

• For the remaining weeks of Lent there should be no meetings on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings due to Lenten services.

We truly appreciate everyone's cooperation with this request. May you all continue your Lenten journey, and we hope to see as many as possible at our various Lenten services!

Blessing of Paschal Food Baskets

Many Orthodox Christians follow the popular tradition of having Paschal food baskets blessed. The custom is to include various foods with which we will break the Lenten fast. A table will be set up on the front, right side of the church for your baskets, which will be blessed at the end of the Liturgy of Pascha. For those not able to come to the Resurrection services, you may bring your baskets to the Agape Vespers. Blessed red eggs will also be distributed after the Agape.

Readers Needed For Agape Vespers

Tradionally, the resurrectional Gospel proclaimed at the Agape Vespers of Pascha is read in multiple languages. This is done to emphasize the universality of the message of Christ's resurrection. Anyone interested in assisting should contact Fr. Anthony as soon as possible. <u>Please remember that we also need someone to recite in English</u>.

2024 Parish Laity Award

Each year, parishes throughout the Metropolis select an exemplary parishioner who demonstrates true Christian stewardship, to be the recipient of the annual Metropolis laity award.
