Beloved in Christ,

One of the twelve major feast days of the Orthodox Church is the *Meeting of Our Lord*, celebrated on February 2nd. In western Christian tradition, this feast is usually referred to as the "Presentation of Our Lord" or sometimes, the "Purification of Mary." The most accurate translation of the original Greek term for this feast – *Hypapante* – is *Meeting*, based on the Greek verb *hypantao*, meaning *to go, or come to meet*. Let us see how this term accurately describes the main thrust of this holy feast.

Upon reading the Gospel passage from Luke describing the original event (Lk 2:22-38), one may immediately conclude that this event is focused on both the ritualistic purification of Mary, as well as the ritual of presenting the first-born male to the Temple according to Mosaic law. The Church, however, sees something deeper than what appears on the surface.

Here is an excellent example of how Orthodoxy views the Church as the only official commentator on Holy Scripture. The Holy Fathers show us clearly, that the presentation of Christ by His parents to the Temple signifies something more than the obvious. The Church Fathers teach us that this event was the formal meeting of the Savior with His people. In the feast of the Meeting of Our Lord, the Old and New Testaments come face to face through the persons of Jesus Christ and the Elder Simeon.

Regarding the Elder Simeon, one tradition teaches that he was the sacrificing priest of the Temple at the time, which is also found in the liturgical text of the feast. Another tradition places Simeon as either one of the official 70 translators of the Hebrew Old Testament into Greek (known as the *Septuagint*), who was allowed by God to live

250 years until the coming of the Messiah; or, that he was most likely a descendent of the 70, placing him into the category of prophet. By considering both cases, we see Simeon representing both the Law and the Prophets of the Old Testament. He stands in the Temple of God on behalf of all the people of Israel, who along with him, have long awaited the coming of the Messiah.

The Holy Fathers have also commented on the divine *kenosis*, or *self-emptying/self-abasement* of the Lord during His presentation. Here we see the *author* of the Law, now *subject* to the Law. Simeon holds in his arms God Incarnate, who has humbled Himself to the extent of accepting human birth, appearing on earth in a form which completely veils His divine glory.

Receive, O Simeon, Him whom Moses once saw in the cloud, granting the law on Sinai, and who has now become a child subject to the law. This is He who spoke through the law, this is He whose voice was heard by the prophets. He has become incarnate for us and saves humanty. Let us worship Him! (from the Vespers of the Feast)

Two other aspects of the feast which are pointed out by the Holy Fathers, have to do with the persons of Joseph and the Prophetess Anna. In the icon of the feast, we see Joseph holding two turtle-doves to be offered for his wife's ritualistic purification after having given birth. This detail clearly shows us that the Holy Family was of modest means, and could not afford a year-old lamb as the Law required. The Holy Fathers again see something deeper; the lamb is *not missing*, for

Christ is the perfect sacrificial lamb – the spotless victim being offered to the world by the hands of Mary. The Fathers also ascribe a meaningful symbol to the turtle-doves,



referring to them as the future Church of Israel and the Church of the Gentiles, which will become one through Christ.

Regarding Anna, she prophetically represents the women heralds of the Resurrection, who went to tell the world about the Risen Lord. She is an example of true Christian witness through her preaching, and her example of fervent prayer and fasting.

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, through the feast of the Meeting of Our Lord, hopefully we can see how certain important passages in the Holy Gospels are not just nice stories or trivial "fillers," meant to add interest to the early part of the life of Christ. By turning to the Holy Tradition of the Church, we find much deeper truths that lead us to a profound understanding of Christ and His sacred ministry upon earth. May we all celebrate this meaningful and symbolic feast of our Church with a clearer understanding of its significance. Let each one of us also meet the Lord within our souls spiritually, as we celebrate this holy feast!

FROM FR. ANTHONY

Triodion Begins February 25

Being that we have a later Pascha this year (May 5), the Triodion period does not begin until February 25, the Sunday of the Publican and Pharisee. As you well know, that particular Sunday commences the three-week preparatory period prior to the beginning of Great Lent. The Triodion period will then continue through all of Great Lent and Holy Week. As a reminder, there is **no fasting** during the first week of the Triodion – all foods are permitted *daily*.

Reflections on the Feast of the Meeting of Christ

The following is taken from *The Incarnate God, Vol. 1*, by Catherine Aslanoff, SVS Press 1995.

The Holy Encounter (Lk 2:22-39)

St. Luke is the only evangelist to show Joseph and Mary as faithful to the commandments of the Law and to the fulfillment of its precepts. Just as they had Jesus circumcised on the eighth day, so they bring him to the Temple forty days after his birth.

The icon of the feast picks up all the elements of the gospel narrative. The action takes place in Jerusalem, at the Temple. Two groups of two persons each share the stage: Joseph and Mary on one side, and the elder Simeon with the prophetess Anna on the other. These four figures face each other, their attitudes indicating encounter and dialogue. The child is the link which unites them. He passes from the arms of Mary to those of Simeon – the movement can be felt in the image. Mary extends her arms in the gesture of offering. We are assisting at the encounter between the Old and the New Testament, the encounter between Jesus and his people. This meeting occurs in the Temple, the place of divine presence.

Rejoice, O Virgin Theotokos, full of grace! From you shone the Sun of Righteousness, Christ our God, enlight ening those who sat in darkness! Rejoice and be glad, O righteous elder; you accepted in your arms the Redeemer of our souls, who grants us the resurrection. (Troparion, tone 1)

Spiritual Wisdom

God loves us more than a father, mother, friend, or anyone else could love, and even more than we are able to love ourselves. (St. John Chrysostom)

The soul that has come to know God fully no longer desires anything else, nor does it attach itself to anything on the earth; and if you put before it a kingdom, it would not desire it, for the love of God gives such sweetness and joy to the soul that even the life of a king can no longer give it any sweetness. (St. Silouan the Athonite)

If someone has repented once of a sin, and again does the same sin, this is a sign that he has not been cleansed of the causes of the sin, wherefrom, as from a root, the shoots spring forth again. (St. Basil the Great)

If our thoughts are peaceful, calm, meek, and kind, then that is what our life is like. (+Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica)

Always have the fear of God in your heart, and remember that God is always with you, everywhere, whether you are walking or sitting. (St. Gennadius of Constantinople)

Fasting is wonderful because it tramples our sins like a dirty weed, while it cultivates and raises truth like a flower. (St. Basil the Great)

Many of us are talkers, few are doers. (St. Maximos the Confessor)


