Beloved in Christ,

Many times we hear the Orthodox Faith referred to as a *living faith*. What exactly does this mean? What would make Orthodoxy a *dead faith*? To understand this concept, first one must comprehend the reality of the unity of the Church on earth – the *Church Militant*, and the Church in heaven – the *Church Triumphant*. Understanding this concept leads us to the realization of the synergistic relationship of these two bodies of the One Church. One important way that we see the proof of this relationship, is through the reality of *miracles*.

To understand miracles, we must remind ourselves of the role of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church. Since the day of Pentecost, the Spirit dwells in the Church, guiding Her in truth and holiness. This is why we Orthodox speak of Holy Tradition with such authority, knowing that through the Holy Spirit, our Faith has been handed down to us by the holy Apostles, and through the teachings of the holy Fathers of the Church throughout the ages. It is because of this indwelling of the Holy Spirit that miracles are part of the life of the Church.

By definition, miracles are unexplainable events in which God acts outside the laws of nature as we understand them. Miracles and signs from God abound in the Old Testament as well as in the New Testament. In the Gospel we hear many of the great number of miracles performed by Christ during His earthly ministry. Throughout the ages and into the present, we see countless miracles occurring through the intercessions of holy people in the Church, both during their life on earth, and after. Again, these great works can only occur through the power of God. This is obvious to us regarding the miracles recorded in Scripture. In the life of the Church, it is also the power of God's Holy Spirit working through His saints, that can intervene in the life of man for our benefit.

This statement – *for our benefit* – is very important. We must always remind

ourselves that miracles do not occur in order for God to "prove" Himself to the world. They occur, rather, in order to benefit man through God's grace and mercy. This beneficial aspect may be found first and foremost, in the sacramental life of the Church – in the Holy Mysteries. Let us remember that at every Divine Liturgy, we are repeatedly in the presence of the greatest miracle of the Church - the mystical transformation of the bread and wine of the Eucharist into the very Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. All the other major sacraments of the Church also have an unexplainable, intangible aspect to them. In all cases, there are obvious benefits for those who participate in these holy mysteries, as the Church teaches us.

Besides the on-going, intangible miracles present in the holy mysteries, there are also tangible miracles performby many saints on our behalf, as mentioned above. Numerous prayers are constantly answered throughout the Orthodox world through miraculous events. Generally, these events typically involve physical healings of various ailments; but of course, they always include *spiritual* healing, which can never be separated from the healing of the body. There is no way that the recipient of a miracle of physical healing could not forever be altered in the soul. Other miracles may involve deliverance from imminent danger, or from major obstacles in one's life.

When considering miracles that have occurred throughout the ages, we constantly see the Theotokos – our beloved *Panayia* – as the source of many of them. Along with her, many of the miracle-working saints answer the prayers of the faithful who are in sickness or distress. Because of their personal holiness and great faith, these shining examples of Christian living were granted the healing power of the Holy Spirit for the benefit of us all.

This, beloved, is why Ortho-

doxy is the *true and living* faith. We are a Church that is both divine and human, found in heaven and on earth, and the two are in constant communion through the power of the



Holy Spirit. A dead faith would not be one of great signs and miracles, but only of words, ideologies, philosophies, and other humanistic teachings that do not find their source in the Holy Spirit. Many today of the New Age movement, seek to blend world religions together in a melting -pot of various expressions of the "truth," of some unknown higher being. Let us never pollute the Orthodox Christian faith in such a way. The Word of God, Jesus Christ, came to us in the form of a man to bring us the one and only Truth – the living water that He spoke about to the Samaritan woman at the well. Through the miracles that continue to happen all around us, we are assured that the living water given to us by Christ continues to flow through His holy Church, bringing us true life – the life in Christ.

May we always turn to our beloved Panayia and all the saints in time of need, and for daily guidance. They love us and seek to help us, according to the will of God. Our prayers to them should always be filled with humble petitions for the Lord's will to be done in our lives. Only God knows why He answers the requests of some and not others. We should never be discouraged when we think our prayers are not being answered. Our constant prayer should be for the salvation of our souls as we journey within the Church Militant, seeking to be eternally within the Church Triumphant. Always remember that eternal life is a reality for us because of the greatest miracle of all - the Holy Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

# FROM FR. ANTHONY

### **Reflections on Theophany**

The following is taken from The Law of God, by Archpriest Seraphim Slobodskoy; Holy Trinity Monastery, 1996.

### The Preaching of St. John the Baptist

When John reached thirty years of age, the Lord directed him to go to the valley of the Jordan River and proclaim to all the people that the Saviour of the world would soon appear, and that all should prepare to meet Him with repentance and baptism.

John went to the region of the Jordan and started to preach, 'Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand,' that is, the time was drawing near when the long awaited Saviour would appear, Who would summon everyone to His kingdom.

For a long time God had not sent a prophet to the Hebrew people. From the time of the last prophet, Malachi, there had passed four hundred years. Therefore, when they heard of the appearance of the Prophet John, and about his marvelous life and teaching, people came from all directions to hear him... In the process [of baptism] John required of everyone that the repentance be sincere and that the correction in oneself be accompanied by good works.

The baptism of John meant that as the body is washed and cleansed by water, thus the soul of a person who repents and believes in the Saviour is cleansed by Christ of all his sins when he is baptized into the Church...

### The Baptism of the Lord Jesus Christ

John did not consider himself worthy to baptize Jesus Christ and began to shrink back from Him saying, 'I have need to be baptized of Thee, and comest Thou to me?' But Jesus, answering, said to him, 'Suffer it to be so now,' that is, do not hold back from me now, 'for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness,' – to fulfill everything in the Law of God and to set an example for people. Then John obeyed and baptized Jesus Christ...

The celebration of the Baptism of the Lord is also called 'Theophany,' or the Manifestation of God, because at the time of baptism God revealed Himself to people as the Holy Trinity in this way: God the Father spoke from Heaven, the incarnate Son of God was baptized, and the Holy Spirit descended in the form of a dove. Also, at the time of baptism, for the first time people could see that in the person of Jesus Christ there appeared not only man, but also God...

### **Orthodox Life Sessions**

The Orthodox Life Sessions that I have been holding on Thursdays, have had very low attendance for quite a while. In the interest of more participation, I will be trying something a bit different in the new year. **Instead of a weekday**, **I will be holding brief sessions focused on one topic, every other Sunday as coffee hour winds down.** Hopefully, many of our parishioners will find this to work best for their schedules.

The first of these sessions will be held **on Sunday**, 1/22. God willing, you can join us as you begin your second cup of coffee!

### House Blessings

As many of you know, there is an Orthodox tradition of blessing homes after Theophany, and also after moving into a new home. If you would like your home blessed, please contact me directly at: <u>franthony@annunciationdover.org</u>, or by phone at the church to make arrangements. In preparation for a house blessing, please note the following:

- On your dining room table or other convenient area, place an icon, a lit candle or vigil lamp, a lit censer if you have one, a small bowl that can be held in one hand, and a small bunch of fresh basil, or a clipping of an evergreen tree.
- Also on the table, place a list of the baptismal names of the Orthodox members of the household, and full first names of any non-Orthodox. Do not include any deceased relatives since the house blessing prayers are for the living.

### **Spiritual Wisdom**

The following is taken from *Way of the Ascetics*, by Tito Colliander (Harper & Row, 1960), who was a pious Russian layman of the 20th century. His writings comprise a spiritual guide, borrowing much from the Desert Fathers and the *Philokalia*.

#### <u>Chapter 22 – On the Use of Material Things</u>

We are made up of soul and body; the two cannot be separated in our conduct. Let the physical therefore come to your aid: Christ knew our weakness and for our sake used words and gestures, spittle and earth as media. For our sake He let His power flow from the fringe of His garment (Matthew 9:20; 14:36), from the handkerchiefs or aprons that were carried away from the apostle Paul's body (Acts 19:12), yes, from the shadow of the apostle Peter (Acts 5:15).

Therefore use all that is of earth as a staff of remembrance on your troublesome wandering along the narrow way. May the whiteness of the snow and the blue of the heavens, the jeweled eye of the fly and the scorching of the flame, and all of creation that meets your senses, remind you of your Creator; but make use especially of what the Church offers you to help you 'yield your members servants to righteousness unto holiness' (Romans 6:19). First of all, the Lord's Holy Communion. But likewise the other mysteries, or sacraments, and the holy Scriptures. And the Church offers you also the holy icons of the Mother of God, the angels and the saints; and prayer before them, and candles and incense, holy water and the gleam of gold, and singing. Receive all this with gratitude and use it all for your upbuilding and encouragement, improvement and benefit as you travel further.

Give free outlet to your love for the generous Lord of love, kiss the Cross and the icons, adorn them with flowers; if only evil be crushed with silence, the good will be allowed to breathe freely. If what is given in love is received with love, the scope of love is increased and enlarged, and this is the aim of your work. The greater the river, the wider the delta.

Use your own body, too, as an aid in the struggle. Trim it down and make it independent of earthly whims. Let it share your trouble: you wish to learn humility, so let the body also be humble and bow to the ground. Fall on your knees with your face to the earth as often as you can in privacy, but get up at once, for after a fall follows restoration in Christ.

Make the sign of the Cross assiduously: it is a wordless prayer. In a brief moment, independent of sluggish words, it gives expression to your will to share Christ's life and crucify your flesh, and willingly, without grumbling, to receive all that the Holy Trinity sends. Moreover, the sign of the Cross is a weapon against evil spirits: use this weapon often and with reflection.

A house is never built until the scaffolding is raised. Only the strong man has no need of outward support. But are you strong? Are you not the weakest among the weak? Are you not a child?
