Orthodox Christians consider koliva to be symbolic of death and resurrection, according to the words of the Gospel: "Verily, verily, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it produces much grain." (John 12:24). Koliva is made of boiled wheat berries, mixed with sugar and spices. It symbolizes the eternal cycle; people, like wheat, must be buried to grow and have new life. We make Koliva for

memorial services to remember those who have fallen asleep in the Lord.
