I lead my Cultural Tour to Russia every year.


<u>Russian Nested Doll Painting</u>

Storytelling and Hands-on Workshop offered on Friday, April 22 from 5:30pm to 8:30pm at the Andover Public Library in Andover, CT



This unique illustrated and interactive presentation/workshop provides a wonderful opportunity for families with children (age 6 and up), teens and adults to learn about the rich folk tradition of Russian Matryoshka (wooden nesting doll) making and to create a finished piece of authentic Russian folk art on wood. It is a great opportunity for children and families to work together and learn about Russian crafts and culture. Participants will hear the story of the Matryoshka doll and will learn about her traditional Russian dress and customs. Traditional Russian painting techniques and floral and berry designs are also introduced. Throughout the workshop, students will be listening to traditional Russian music, and there will be a demonstration of a few steps from a traditional Russian "matryoshka dance." The slide-show presentation will include a guick visit to a doll-making factory in rural Russia to see the stages in the doll making process, and some beautiful examples of the finest Matryoshka artwork available in Russia to stimulate creativity and imagination. After the storytelling presentation, there will be an optional "hands-on" component where

anyone who chooses to participate can paint an authentic Russian wooden doll. (There is a materials fee for anyone participating in the hands-on component of the program. This fee (from \$10 to \$55) covers the cost of the wooden doll and the use of paints for painting on wood and brushes for the workshop.)

No painting experience is required for my Icon Painting class. Experienced artists will also feel very comfortable in my workshop.




Traditional Russian icon painting is truly one of the great artistic movements in the history of the world and has been a living and evolving art form for more than 1,000 years. This illustrated presentation by Marina Forbes deals with the spiritual and secular significance of Russian religious art from the 10th century to the present day. Icon making involves the painting of specifically stylized religious images on wood using traditional natural materials and techniques which are determined by longstanding conventions which serve to shape the art form. Russian icons reveal a deep inner spirituality, incomparably matched by an intrinsic rhythm of line and harmony of coloring. Using a slide show and numerous exhibits, including examples of her own work, Forbes will examine the history of icon painting in Russia and will discuss the unique multiple nature of the icon as a sacred object, a product of an artistic tradition, a work of art with its own inherent aesthetic value, and a major example of our world cultural heritage. Anyone who has personal icons may bring them for examination and comment.

Imperial Russian Faberge Eggs

This unique and beautifully illustrated presentation will focus on the life and remarkable work of Russian master jeweler and artist, Peter Carl Fabergé. Emphasis is on the important role of egg painting in Russian culture and on the unique development of this major Russian art form from a traditional craft to the level of exquisite fine art under the patronage of the tsars. The fascinating history of these eggs and their role in the dramatic events of the last decades of Romanov rule in Russia and in the years following the Bolshevik Revolution will also be discussed.

Students will learn about board and painting surface preparation, gessoing, image rendering, pigments, brush strokes techniques, detailing, highlighting, gilding, Old Slavonic lettering, and varnishing.

No painting experience is required for this Icon Painting class. Experienced artists will also feel very comfortable in the class. I normally have between 3 and 7 students in my class.

The cost is \$349 and it includes all the materials*.

* If you would like to apply 23-k gold to the halo <u>using garlic glue, 23-k gold can be purchased at the workshop from</u> the instructor and the cost is \$10.
