"New Ecclesiastical Year"

September 1 is considered the beginning of the New Ecclesiastical Year.

At the same time, however, September marks the beginning of sowing.

The farmers are preparing to sow the seed in the field so that at the right time they can reap the fruits. From a Christian point of view, the beginning of the church year is an occasion for the renewal of our spiritual efforts that will bear the expected fruits.

This is reminiscent of a parable of the Lord. According to this, in a field there was a tree, a fig tree, which for a number of years did not bear fruit. That's why they wanted to cut it. Then the gardener who was in charge of the tree asked the owner of the property not to cut it but to wait another year. "Lord, let it alone this year also," the text of the gospel says. The gardener asked for this postponement in order to dig the soil around the tree, to also put fertilizer, lest it bear fruit.

Christ in this parable meant that God gives us life. There is a reason that allows us to live. This is because He expects us to bear spiritual fruit.

Man did not come into this world simply to have a family, to do his business, to have fun, or to suffer. He did not come just to have his dreams or nightmares, to have a good time or to live with the threats of war and disease. The only reason we have come to life is the spiritual fruitfulness that leads to the sanctification of the soul. This is why God allows us to live "this year also."

We often say, "As I was last year, so I am this year." This stagnation is not a good thing. Man must work spiritually unceasingly. If he is distracted and sleeps spiritually, he is lost. How we admire the eagle! How high can he fly! In each of his flights there are moments when he stops. But he still goes on. If he loses height, he will regain it. But if he stops and is distracted there is a risk of falling and being killed.

So now that we are at the beginning of the church year, let us make a new beginning in our spiritual endeavors. And this will be done in the Church. Christ came to earth, taught, performed miracles, suffered, was crucified, was resurrected and founded the Church. Man is saved when he believes in the Church, he lives the life of the Church. It is not enough to say that "I have come to know Christ and I believe in Christ." If we do not meet Christ in the Church, then we have not met the true Christ. The Church is the body of Christ and only when we are in the Church then are we united with Christ.

Like a vehicle moving on a road without road signs. It is dangerous to get offroad. The same happens in our spiritual life as well. The Saints are signs, and signposts of our spiritual life. They show us the way to salvation.

Finally, let us learn to study the word of God. We often try to provide a solution and answer to the problems of our lives. We have to study the word of God because there is the answer.

With these thoughts, let us renew our spiritual endeavors and thank God who gave us life "this year also."

Νέο Εκκλησιαστικό Έτος.

Η 1η Σεπτεμβρίου θεωρείται η έναρξη του Νέου Εκκλησιαστικού Έτους. Παράλληλα όμως ο Σεπτέμβριος σηματοδοτεί την έναρξη της σποράς. Οι γεωργοί ετοιμάζονται να ρίξουν τον σπόρο στο χωράφι ώστε την κατάλληλη εποχή να λάβουν τους καρπούς. Από Χριστιανική άποψη η αρχή του εκκλησιαστικού έτους είναι αφορμή για την ανανέωση των πνευματικών μας προσπαθειών που θα φέρουν τους αναμενόμενους καρπούς.

Αυτό θυμίζει μια παραβολή του Κυρίου. Σύμφωνα με αυτή σε ένα χωράφι υπήρχε κάποιο δέντρο, μια συκιά, που επί σειρά ετών δεν έδινε καρπούς. Για αυτό τον λόγο ήθελαν να το κόψουν. Τότε ο κηπουρός που ήταν υπεύθυνος για το δέντρο παρακάλεσε τον ιδιοκτήτη του κτήματος να να μη το κόψουν αλλά να περιμένουν ακόμα ένα χρόνο. "Κύριε, άφες αυτήν και τούτο το έτος", λέει το κείμενο του ευαγγελίου. Ο κηπουρός ζήτησε αυτή την αναβολή ώστε να σκάψει το χώμα γύρω από το δέντρο, να βάλει επίσης λίπασμα, μήπως δώσει καρπό.

Ο Χριστός με αυτή την παραβολή ήθελε να πει ότι ο Θεός μας χαρίζει ζωή. Υπάρχει λόγος που μας επιτρέπει να ζούμε. Ο λόγος αυτός είναι ότι περιμένει να φέρουμε πνευματικούς καρπούς.

Ο άνθρωπος δεν ήρθε σε αυτό τον κόσμο απλώς και μόνο για να κάνει οικογένεια, να κάνει τις δουλειές του, να διασκεδάζει ή να ταλαιπωρείται. Δεν ήρθε απλώς για να έχει τα όνειρα ή τους εφιάλτες του, να περνάει καλά ή να ζει με τις απειλές πολέμων και αρρωστειών. Ο μοναδικός λόγος που έχουμε έρθει στη ζωή είναι η πνευματική καρποφορία που οδηγεί στον αγιασμό της ψυχής. Αυτός είναι ο λόγος που ο Θεός επιτρέπει να ζούμε "και τούτο το έτος".

Πολλές φορές λέμε, "όπως ήμουν πέρυσι έτσι είμαι και φέτος." Αυτή η στασιμότητα δεν είναι καλό πράγμα. Ο άνθρωπος πρέπει να δουλεύει από πνευματική άποψη ακατάπαυστα. Εάν ξεχαστεί και κοιμηθεί πνευματικά, χάνεται. Πόσο θαυμάζουμε τον αετό! Πόσο ψηλά μπορεί να πετάξει! Σε κάθε πτήση του υπάρχουν στιγμές που σταματάει. Αλλά και πάλι συνεχίζει. Αν χάσει ύψος πάλι θα το ανακτήσει. Αν σταματήσει όμως και αφαιρεθεί υπάρχει κίνδυνος να πέσει και να σκοτωθεί.

Ο άνθρωπος κάνει τον αγώνα του σύμφωνα με το μέτρο των δυνατοτήτων του. Δεν μπορούν όλοι οι άνθρωποι να αγωνιστούν όπως για παράδειγμα οι παλαιοί ασκητές και ερημίτες. Μπορούν όμως να αγωνιστούν. Ο Θεός βλέπει την διάθεση του ανθρώπου, βλέπει την προσπάθεια, τον κόπο του, την ταπείνωσή του και αυτά τα αμείβει με σωτηρία.

Τώρα λοιπόν που είμαστε στην αρχή του εκκλησιαστικού έτους, ας κάνουμε μια νέα αρχή στις πνευματικές μας προσπάθειες. Και αυτό θα γίνει μέσα στην Εκκλησία. Ο Χριστός ήρθε στη γη, δίδαξε, θαυματούργησε, έπαθε, σταυρώθηκε, αναστήθηκε και ίδρυσε την Εκκλησία. Ο άνθρωπος σώζεται όταν πιστεύει στην Εκκλησία, ζει τη ζωή της Εκκλησίας. Δεν αρκεί να πει ότι "γνώρισα τον Χριστό και πιστεύω στον Χριστό." Εάν δεν συναντήσουμε τον Χριστό μέσα στην Εκκλησία, τότε δεν συναντήσαμε τον αληθινό Χριστό. Η Εκκλησία είναι το σώμα του Χριστού και μόνον όταν είμαστε μέσα στην Εκκλησία τότε ενωνόμαστε με τον Χριστό.

Όπως ένα όχημα που κινείται σε δρόμο χωρίς οδική σήμανση είναι επικίνδυνο να εκτροχιαστεί έτσι και στην πνευματική μας ζωή. Σήματα, και οδοδείκτες της πνευματικής μας ζωής είναι οι Άγιοι. Αυτοί μας δείχνουν τον δρόμο που οδηγεί στη σωτηρία.

Τέλος, να μάθουμε να μελετάμε τον λόγο του Θεού. Προσπαθούμε πολλές φορές να δώσουμε λύση και απάντηση στα προβλήματα της ζωής μας. Να μελετάμε τον λόγο του Θεού γιατί εκεί, βρίσκεται η απάντηση.

Greetings Sisters and Brothers in Christ!

September is a time of beginnings. Children are back in school and summer vacations are over.



The month of September was, for the Hebrews, the beginning of the civil year (Exodus 23:16), the month of gathering the harvest and of offering thanks to God. St. Nikolai Velimorovich, in The Prologue of Ohrid, says that It was on this feast that the Lord Jesus entered the synagogue in Nazareth (Luke 4:16-21), opened the book of the Prophet Isaiah and read the words: The Spirit of the Lord God is upon Me; because the Lord hath anointed Me to preach good tidings unto the meek; He hath sent Me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound; to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all that mourn (Isaiah 61:1-2).

As a parish family, with this new year we are renewing ministries that have suffered in the recent past. For example, Sunday School has a new beginning this year with a new administrator, the Greek Festival is being renewed as a live event at our church, the Bookstore has received a face lift and a new dedication and we have added an Agora, both of which are open each Sunday, and the dance troupe has once again begun to come together as a group for practices and fellowship.

But what is each of us individually doing to "proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord?" Since we are the Lord's disciples, we each must personally resolve to "preach good tidings" and "proclaim liberty to the captives." Admittedly this may seem difficult at times. Nevertheless, In all things, we remain hopeful that "the Lord will give strength unto his people" (Ps 29), and that we may truly say, "I sought the Lord, and he heard me; he delivered me from all my fears" (Ps 34). Whatever our labor in the coming year may be, we believe that if it is in the Lord, that it "is not in vain," (1 Cor 15:58), and we trust that the Lord will bless us and add to our number daily those who are being saved (Acts 2:47).

Our resolution to follow the Lord requires personal commitment – our time, our talent, our treasure, our prayers, and our presence. We are all parts of the Body of Christ (1 Cor 12:28), and as such we must be present together in worship. In his book "Nature, Man and God" William Temple writes: "Worship is the submission of all our nature to God. It is the quickening of conscience by His holiness; the nourishment of mind with His truth; the purifying of the imagination by His beauty; the opening of the heart to His love, the surrender of will to His purpose — and all this gathered up in adoration, (is) the most selfless emotion of which our nature is capable...". Worship requires participation. It is an intentional relationship with God on a daily basis.

As we head into the new ecclesiastical year, let us carefully discern how we might participate more fully in the work of Christ in our church by volunteering for a ministry, increasing our attendance at services, or inviting a friend to worship with us.

As Christians, our resolution to follow Christ also involves stewardship of our local parish and our metropolis. Unfortunately, our parish continues to have difficulty in terms of our stewardship giving meeting the needs of our community. A careful analysis would indicate that we are likely to experience a shortfall in the coming years. We have had several instances this year where we have had to spend from our reserves for major repairs and although they are not depleted, the level of stewardship giving is not keeping up with the spending. Through close oversight, the Parish Council has worked to keep our "normal" expenses below budgetary expectations. But there is little more that we can "cut" if we desire to maintain our current level of ministry, including our missionary efforts through the OCMC, our support of our beloved St. Photos national shrine as well as our outreach support to local organizations, and of course, our ability to maintain our church with a full-time priest.

We will soon begin to build the proposed 2023 budget - our roadmap for our next year of ministry together - to be presented in our November General Assembly. The budget will strive to honestly acknowledge the financial reality that we must rebuild and renew, and yet will do so in a spirit of hope. We will be challenged to put our treasure where our heart is (Mt 6:21), and we will all be called to action, to recognize that "the night is coming, when no one can work" (Jn 9:4). Now is the time to prepare to offer our very best (Mk 12:41-44), that we may not be found unready when the Bridegroom comes (Mt 25:6). Please pray about how you may "proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord" in 2022-2023.

Once again, it is a privilege to be your Parish Council president and I thank you all for your trust and support. I ask your continued prayers for our Church, Bishops, Priest, our entire council, and also for one another. May God continue to guide us and strengthen us each day.

The Feast Day of Phanourios the Great Martyr & Newly Appeared of Rhodes

Saint Phanourios Celebration



Very little has been passed down about the life of the holy, glorious and right-victorious Great-martyr Phanourios the Newly Appeared of Rhodes, the Miracle-Worker (commemorated on August 27). Around 1500, a previously forgotten chapel was unearthed in Rhodes. All the icons in the chapel were disfigured or crumbling, but one was still intact. It features a young man named as "St. Phanourios," holding a candle-topped cross. Surrounding the central icon are a series of twelve smaller icons depicting the saint's refusal to give up his faith and the tortures that he endured in the process.

Because of the icon's miraculously fresh appearance, as well as the evidence that St. Phanourios maintained the Faith through his tortures all the way to his martyrdom, the Church agreed that he should be revered as a saint. People began to venerate the icon, and they became aware that the prayers of the saint are blessed with miraculous intervention,

asking St. Phanourios to pray that they would again find lost items and/or that they would regain their health.


People began to bake a special sweet bread to share in thanksgiving for the saint's prayers and honoring him through a symbolic cake, called the "Phanouropita," which can be brought to the church at any time for a blessing. Phanouropita should be baked as a request to the saint for help, or in thanksgiving after he has helped, and then shared.

On August 28, with our visiting priest Fr. Michael Byars, prayers in honor of St. Phanourios were read over the many Phanouropitas that were offered. Through the prayers of St. Phanourios, may we find blessings and small miracles.


