Beloved in Christ.

As we begin yet another new ecclesiastical year on September 1st, I greet you all in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We also welcome back all our parish families from their travels and other summer activities, as everyone prepares to resume their usual routines. September is not only a time to refocus on various aspects of our secular lives, but more importantly, to refocus spiritually. Our Orthodox Church, as a loving mother, opens her arms each new ecclesiastical year to embrace and draw near all her children, young and old, so that we may continue growing in Christ toward our mutual salvation.

Notice my usage of the word *mutual*. This is key to understanding the Orthodox view of salvation. Our spiritual growth can only happen through the Church. In Orthodoxy Christianity, one cannot be an island on his own. Even hermits in the monastic world still belong to a monastery in order to have spiritual fellowship, and to receive the Eucharist along with their brethren at the Divine Liturgy on Sundays and feast days.

For Orthodox Christians living in the secular world, our spiritual haven is our local parish. It is where we come together in loving fellowship to prayerfully enjoy the Divine Liturgy, to be fed the Word of God through Scripture, as well as the Lord's sacred Body and Blood toward our spiritual nourishment and growth. We experience all this as a united family in Christ, especially when we receive Holy Communion. It's easy to see this act merely as *personal*, between Christ and oneself, but the reality is that the Eucharist is also a communal act. Holy Communion unites us to Christ and to each other, as we eat and drink from the same cup.

In his book, *Liturgy and Life*, by Fr. Alexander Schmemann of blessed memory (Orthodox Church in America, 1983), he says the following regarding Orthodox worship: *The Church as life and grace is realized through her worship. The Greek word for worship – leiturgia –*

means more than common prayer: it means corporate action, in which everyone takes an active part, is a participant and not only an 'attendant.' The nature of this action is both corporate and personal. It is corporate because through the unity and faith of its participants it realizes and fulfills the reality of Church, i.e. the presence of Christ among those who believe in Him. It is personal because this reality is every time conveyed to me, given me for my personal edification, for my own growth in grace. Thus in worship I am both an active 'builder' of the Church – and to be this is my Christian duty - and I am also its 'beneficiary' - for the whole of the Church's treasure is offered to me, is a Divine gift to me.

Let us consider some similarities between our home life and our life in the Church. In family life, we look forward to our evening meals when we are all together around the table. This is a sacred time when families invoke God's blessings, enjoy downtime away from work and other tasks, and grow closer through everyone sharing their daily experiences.

Our church experience is very similar. We come together on the first day of the week to invoke God's blessings upon ourselves, our families, and our fellow brethren in Christ. At church we leave the world behind temporarily. We are spiritually fed during the Liturgy as mentioned above, and we grow closer by interacting at our weekly fellowship hour. In addition to Sunday and weekday liturgical services, we also have the blessing of various ministry gatherings and social events that periodically bring us together in Christian fellowship.

Here at the Annunciation we have been blessed with a core group of dedicated parishioners who are consistent both with their liturgical participation, as well as their involvement in various ministries of the church, and with other activities and events. Having said this, in parish life throughout the Archdiocese there are always "empty chairs" around the table. From time to time, someone might take a place at the table, or sadly, these

chairs may rarely be occupied.

We pray that more and more of our beloved parishioners will fill the table all around as much as possible. Our parish is a



spiritual mother that has raised and nurtured so many of you over the years. For those who have married and are raising families, it is now your children's sacred privilege to be part of the life of the parish as well.

We cannot put a price on the mutual love and support that we find in parish life. God gives to us freely His abundant and unending grace, love, and mercy. By regularly coming to church, we receive these gifts and more, in humility and thanksgiving along with our brethren in Christ. In short, there is so much to *gain* through our participation in the life of the Church, and unfortunately, much from which we will miss out in our absence.

We hope and pray that we will see more of you in church this coming new ecclesiastical year. Besides Sunday services, we also have two major feasts of the Church occurring in the coming weeks – the Nativity of the Theotokos on Thursday, 9/8, followed by the Elevation of the Holy Cross on Wednesday, 9/14. Both of these feasts will be preceded by Great Vespers on the eve of each feast. God willing, Church School also resumes the following Sunday on 9/18.

My beloved brothers and sisters in the Lord, come and join your family in Christ! Come and be spiritually renewed! Come to receive the multiple gifts that God grants us through His Church! As the Lord clearly told us: Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. (Matthew 7:7).

FROM FR. ANTHONY

Reflections on the Holy Cross

The following is taken from *Orthodox Dogmatic Theology*, by Fr. Michael Pomazansky, St. Herman of Alaska Brotherhood, 1994.

It is clear that in the mystery of redemption the Cross and Resurrection of the Lord are inseparable. In the consciousness of the Church this truth is expressed in full measure in the Paschal hymns, which confess the power of the Resurrection of Christ not only for the personal salvation of the Christian, but also in the final, complete justification of the world... By the Cross has been accomplished the cleansing of the sins of the world, the reconciliation with God; by the Resurrection new life has been brought into the world.

The Orthodox path of the Christian is the path of the cross and of struggle. In other words, it is the path of patience, of the bearing of sorrows, persecutions for the name of Christ, and dangers from the enemies of Christ, of despising the goods of the world for the sake of Christ, of battling against one's passions and lusts.

Such a path of following Christ was taken by His Apostle. 'I am crucified with Christ,' writes the Apostle Paul (Gal. 2:20). 'God forbid that I should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world (Gal. 6:14)'...

All believers are called to struggle according to their strength: 'They that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the passions and lusts (Gal. 5:24).' The moral life cannot exist without inward battle, without self-restraint. The Apostle writes: 'For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ; whose end is destruction, whose god is their belly, and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things (Phil. 3:18-19)'...

Spiritual Wisdom

Be a persecutor of thyself; then thy foe shall be driven away from thee. (St. Isaac the Syrian)

I am not afraid of death. Not, of course, because of my works, but because I believe in God's mercy. (+Elder Epiphanios Theodoropoulos of Athens)

It isn't merely enough to love one another; we must love the other more than ourselves. A mother loves her children more than she loves herself. She will stay hungry to feed her children, yet she feels greater pleasure than they do. The children are fed materially, but she is fed spiritually. They experience the taste of food, while she experiences spiritual rejoicing. (St. Paisios the Athonite)

As fire does not give birth to snow, so those who seek honor here will not enjoy it in heaven. (St. John Climacus)

Regard as free not those whose status makes them outwardly free, but those who are free in their character and conduct. For we should not call men truly free when they are wicked and dissolute, since they are slaves to worldly passions. Freedom and happiness of soul consist in genuine purity and detachment from transitory things. (St. Anthony the Great)

The Church, under persecution, scores victories. When insulted, it becomes even more radiant. It receives injuries, but it does not succumb to the wounds. It sails through rough seas, but it does not sink. It fights, but it is never defeated. O man, there is nothing more powerful than the Church. (St. John Chrysostom)

Important Message Regarding the Eucharist

The following message is from the July-August, 2022 issue of *The Annunciator* – the monthly bulletin of the Annunciation Church of Brockton, Mass. The author is Fr. Romanos Karanos, presiding priest and professor of Byzantine Chant at Holy Cross School of Theology. His message is very appropriate and worth our careful attention and reflection.

The Eucharist has been the subject of much debate lately, due to the coronavirus pandemic. Many doubt its truth, some are confused, others outright blaspheme against it. This is not a new issue. When Christ told His disciples: "you must eat My Body and drink My Blood, otherwise you have no life in you," they responded: "this is a hard saying, Master," and some of them left Him! So we see that the doubting of the sacrament begins back then, even before its institution during the Mystical Supper. The Church understands that it is difficult for people to believe and does not force its faith on anyone. Besides, it is dangerous to talk about something that transcends logic and can be approached only by the heart.

St. John of Damascus stresses that only one stance is proper before this sacrament: reverent silence. We must not rationalize the sacrament, examine its every little detail, when and how the bread and wine are changed into the Body and Blood of Christ, why they retain their taste and smell, where exactly they go after we have swallowed them. The Western Church attempted to answer these questions without much success and unwittingly led to the secularization of a mystery so sacred and beyond understanding, that the angels who are invisibly inside the altar cover their faces with their wings, so as not to be blinded by its glory! In older times, when the deacon said: "Guard the doors! Guard the doors!," the doors were actually closed, so that nobody who would not receive Holy Communion might enter.

Holy Communion is a fire that burns the weak of faith. Today several brothers and sisters unfortunately do not partake of the sacrament, or partake without proper spiritual preparation. This prompts me to present our Church's experience and theology on this most sacred mystery. Let me start with the fundamental truth: there is no such thing as church without Holy Communion. St. Nicholas Cabasilas wisely explains that Holy Communion and the Church are one and the same thing. The Church is the Body of Christ. Holy Communion is also the Body of Christ. So the Church and Holy Communion are identical entities.

Some brothers and sisters limit their relationship with God to individual prayer. Individual prayer is of course holy and necessary. But we are not saved as individuals! We are saved as a community when we come together in worship and receive Holy Communion! We are baptized, so that we may receive. We confess, so that we may receive. We fast, so that we may receive. We come to church, so that we may receive! Christ warns us that if we do not partake of the mystery, we do not have life in us: "Truly, truly I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you." (John 6:53)

But what about people of other faiths and denominations who do not commune? Don't they have life in them? Will they be eternally condemned? The answer is simple. They do not have true life in them, just like the Orthodox who don't commune do not have true life in them. As for whether they will go to heaven, this is for God to decide. According to St. Paul, non-Christians will be judged according to different, perhaps less strict, criteria. But for us things are clear. Do we commune? We have life! Do we not? It is time to change our spiritual course!
