

Beloved in Christ,

Each year, the secularization of Christmas becomes more pronounced, starting from the beginning of the sea-son through the feast itself. It is amazing to hear of retailers opening during the pre-dawn hours after Thanksgiving, on what has been named "Black Friday;" in fact, some retailers even adver-tise "pre-Black Friday sales!" As all the madness of the retail world unfolds around us during this time of year, simultaneously, schools and government bodies stifle any reference to what this season is really about, eliminating any reference to the birth of Christ. In the retail world, it is obvious that employees are instructed not to use the greeting Merry Christmas, but rather, Happy Holidays. Now I ask, do we Orthodox simply take all this in stride, or do we attempt to reclaim the sanctity of this

holy season to whatever extent we can? For the Orthodox Christian, the primary focus during the Nativity fast season should be a personal, spiritual prep-aration for the birth of Christ. As I explain each year, the Orthodox preparation for the Nativity of Christ stands in stark contrast to the worldly observance of the "Christmas season," or to be more politically correct, the "holiday season." For us, the Nativity fast serves as a *vigil*, as we prayerfully await the birth of our Lord. For the secular world, this is a time of excessive*ness* – both materialistically, and in the indulgence in food, drink, and merriment. A former parishioner of mine recently wrote to me and made the following profound statement that sums this all up: They say Christmas is the best time of the year, but it has been hijacked and turned into a commercial frenzy of consumer delights.

As with all the fast periods of the Orthodox liturgical calendar, we observe this fast with dietary restrictions, increased prayer and church attendance, and by performing charitable acts. To complete our preparation for the coming of Christ, we should also seek repentance for our sins and shortcomings, and receive spiritual cleansing through the holy mystery of Confession. After the 40 days of preparation, we are then truly ready to celebrate the birth of Christ through the various church services, most especially at the Divine Liturgy of the Nativity at which we partake of His Spotless Body and Blood.

Even if we observe all these things, the reality is that we are surrounded by the secular observance of the "holiday season." It is not impossible, however, to live in a pluralistic society as we do, and be able to maintain an Orthodox way of life. It may take some "spiritual creativity," but if we are sincere in our efforts, we can maintain an attitude of spiritual vigil throughout the season. If we are obligated to attend pre-Christmas parties at work or at the homes of non-Orthodox relatives and neighbors, we should go and partake in a limited fashion of what the host has prepared. This has always been the advice of the Holy Fathers when we are confronted with such situations during a period of fasting. Obviously however, these should not be seen as opportunities to be gluttonous and lose all self-control! The other advice I always give regarding "rowdy" Christmas parties that include much drinking and carousing, is to politely excuse one's self as the party begins going "downhill."

Now, am I saying that no one is supposed to have fun during this festive time of the year? Of course not, because there *is* a definite time for celebrating. For the Orthodox Church, the actual celebration begins on the feast of the Nativity and ends on January 4th, just prior to the celebration of Holy Theophany. From the Orthodox perspective, *this* is the time for Christmas parties, when we *should* be rejoicing and celebrating the great event of the birth of our Lord in the flesh. During this period, the Church purposefully prohibits fasting in order to emphasize the joy of the season. Why not consider introducing Orthodox Christmas parties in our homes during the eleven

days of feasting, and invite other Orthodox families as well as friends and neighbors, in order to celebrate the true *reason for the season* (as much as I dislike overused, cliché expressions, this



one works well here)?

Besides those things already mentioned, there are also other ways to keep Christ ever-present in Christmas. As much as possible, continue saying, "have a Merry Christmas," or "have a Blessed Christmas," which stands out even more profoundly as a Christian greeting. In our homes, we could strive to accentuate the spiritual nature of the advent season through our decorations and family traditions. Why not de-emphasize the mythological side of Christmas in order to not confuse our children? Teach them about St. Nicholas and St. Basil instead. And most importantly, have them involved with charitable acts, such as visits to nursing homes, helping at a soup kitchen, shopping for a needy family, bringing used items to charitable organizations, etc.

Beloved in Christ, especially in our homes, we have the complete ability to make the pre-Christmas season a holy time for our families. In the world at large, we also have the ability to overlook the secular corruption of this season, and to keep a spiritual focus. Let us attempt each year, to put more of an Orthodox perspective into our preparation for, and celebration of the Holy Nativity of Christ. We should see this is as a sacred responsibility toward the salvation of our children, and of ourselves!

Nativity Fast Continues Through 12/24

On November 15th, the Holy Orthodox Church began its preparation for the Nativity of our Lord through a 40-day fast. The majority of this period is considered a relaxed fast, and not particularly strict until the final 12 days. Following are the generally accepted guidelines for the first and second parts of the Nativity fast, for those who desire to follow it to the full extent.

<u>Up to 12/12</u>

- Fasting from all animal products. Shellfish may be consumed daily.
- Fish, wine (all alcoholic beverages), and olive oil may be consumed daily except for Wednesdays and Fridays.*

*Wine and olive oil are permitted on feasts of major saints - see Archdiocesan calendar.

From 12/13 - 12/24

- Strict fasting from all animal products, including fish. Shellfish may be consumed daily.
- Fasting from wine and olive oil on weekdays.*

*Wine and olive oil may be consumed on Saturdays and Sundays, and on the feasts of major saints.

It behooves us to prepare ourselves spiritually for the Nativity of Our Lord by attempting to keep this fast to whatever extent possible (with the exception of course, of those with particular health concerns, and growing children). As with all fast periods of the Church, remember to incorporate regular church attendance, increased prayer, and charitable works. Holy Confession is also part of each fast season of the Church. I am always available for guidance, so please don't hesitate to ask!

Seasonal Reflections

The following is taken from the book, *The Winter Pascha*, by Fr. Thomas Hopko, St. Vladimir's Seminary Press, 1984.

The Christmas-Epiphany season in the Orthodox Church begins with a forty-day fasting period which starts on the feast of the "holy and all-praised apostle Philip." For this reason, Christmas lent is sometimes called "the fast of Philip." Although the coincidence of the feast of the apostle Philip and the beginning of the Christmas fast is accidental, humanly speaking, the eyes of faith may see in it a certain providence of God.

According to St. John's gospel, Philip is one of the first of the apostles to be called by Jesus. On the day after the calling of Andrew and another of St. John the Baptist's disciples, who, since he is not named, is probably the apostle John himself, Philip is called by the Lord. Like Andrew who went and called his brother Simon Peter, Philip goes and calls his friend Nathanael...

The story is typical of St. John's gospel. The people first encounter the man "Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." They meet Him as a man, the one "of whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote." Then they go further. What they come to see is that this man is not merely the promised prophet and teacher; He is the Anointed, the Christ, the Messiah, the King of Israel. He is the Son of God. Indeed, He is God Himself in human form...

The first step on the way of the Winter Pascha is the encounter with the man Jesus. We are invited with Philip and the disciples, to "come and see." If we want to come and want to see, we will. Like the first disciples, we will see "greater things" than we ever expected. We will see "heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man." We will see Jesus as our Master, and will cry to Him: "Rabbi, You are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" And we will come to know Him for who and what He really is. But first we must come. For if we do not come, we will never see...

Holy Confession Schedule

The tradition of the Orthodox Church encourages regularity with Holy Confession, which includes each major fast period, as well as on an "as needed" basis. Now that we are within the Nativity fast, it is time to approach this holy mystery so that we may be cleansed and prepared for the birth of our Savior. Holy Confession is available per the usual schedule as follows:

- Saturdays after Great Vespers
- During office hours by appointment

"Priest" Solicitation Scams

Now that we are within the Christmas season, please know that criminal activity typically picks up this time of year. Once again, hackers are impersonating me by using my name to communicate with parishioners, through outside email addresses and phone numbers. They typically state, "I'm in a meeting and can't talk, but I need you to purchase some gift cards for someone, etc. etc." **Please do not fall prey to this scam!**

As I have stated before, I would never solicit assistance for anyone in this manner. I would only work, confidentially, through our Outreach Committee when there is a need, either within or outside our parish. Again, on these suspicious messages, always look at the e-mail address attached to my name, and you will see that it is not my actual church e-mail address. The same applies to text messages that use other numbers, which are not my emergency contact number. All my contact information appears in both the weekly and monthly bulletins, as well as on our website.

Church Lighting Enhancement

Our next project, which incorporates both beautification and a necessary enhancement, is the installation of four smaller brass chandeliers in the Nave. Please note the following regarding this project:

- Our Nave especially the Soleas is not adequately bright, which is noticeable on Sundays and feast days.
- The new chandeliers will replace the unsightly hanging fans, which no longer serve a purpose.
- Lighting professionals guided us to chandeliers with a polished brass finish, that will blend in stylistically with our existing large chandelier, as well as add additional brightness.
- This improvement in the Nave will not only add needed additional lighting, but will also enhance the elegance and beauty of our holy temple.

As we do with all our beautification projects and liturgical needs, we reach out to our generous and faithful parishioners who would be willing to sponsor one of the four, new chandeliers. We are still gathering pricing information for the purchase and installation, so as soon as that is determined, we will share the cost per chandelier for those considering becoming a donor. May God bless all those who will assist in this project!

"*Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.*" Matthew 25:40

For Orthodox Christians, the act of alms-giving is seen as a way to cultivate spiritual growth and develop a deeper relationship with God. "Through the cheap price of doing good to men, we can acquire the priceless Kingdom of God." (Philaret, Metropolitan of Moscow)

Alms-giving is not just about giving money; it also includes offering time, support, and acts of kindness to those in need. At every time of year, but especially during the great fasts of the Church, it is important to remember to do good by sharing the good things God has entrusted us with. There are many ways to give, and the church offers us some excellent opportunities to do so. We encourage everyone to take advantage of these opportunities. As we journey to the Lord's Nativity together, may we look in our hearts and open our hands to the many needs around us, always remembering that giving is not just an obligation, but a privilege; it is not just a duty, but a blessing:

"Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the LORD, and he will repay him for his deed." (Prov 19:7)

May the Lord bless you as you seek to bless others this Nativity, and always!


