Beloved in Christ,

Having recently taken leave of Holy Pascha, and are currently celebrating the Holy Ascension of Our Lord, it is an appropriate time to focus on the reality of death that we will all eventually face, as God wills. The Resurrection of Christ has conquered death, proving to us that the soul continues to live after physical death; and also, that at the Second Coming of Christ we will be physically resurrected and reunited with our souls. I would like, therefore, to offer some thoughts about the Orthodox view on death.

As an Orthodox Christian priest, one of the many things I appreciate very much in our faith tradition, is the manner in which the Orthodox Church deals with death. We deal with death head-on, as opposed to attempting to mask death as the current trend seems to be in some circles. Obviously, various faith traditions will have their particular manner of dealing with death and mourning. However, the question must be asked: does society in general deal with death in a healthy manner, in order to help those left behind find closure?

In today's world there seems to be an increasing obsession with youth and beauty – a “fountain of youth” mentality which futilely seeks to escape the realities of the human condition. This mentality obviously has an underlying reason, which is the fear of, and unwillingness to deal with sickness, aging, and dying. When we see how various people deal with death, one must wonder if certain choices made are based on fear, which stems from a basic lack of faith.

Many people are choosing cremation for themselves, thinking that this is an all-around better choice, not considering the effect this may have on those left behind. In some faith traditions, funerals are held with the body in a casket, however the casket remains closed the entire time. In both scenarios, the deceased may not have been seen at any point by the family and loved ones. Some families hold a “celebration of life” gathering, without a prior opportunity for mourning and moving toward closure.

In our Orthodox Christian tradition, funerals are always conducted with an open casket. The only exception is when there is a possible health hazard due to a contagious disease or decomposition, or due to total mutilation of the body from an accident. In addition, cremation is not permitted for Orthodox Christians, basically because it is seen as a denial of the basic Christian belief of the future resurrection of the body, at which time it will be reunited with its immortal soul; and also, because it is seen as a violent act against God's creation, which served as the temple of the person's soul while alive.

Orthodox Christianity teaches that humans have been created in the image and likeness of God. With this belief as a starting point, the Orthodox Church respects human beings and treats them with great dignity, both in this life and beyond. Each human being is seen as an icon of God, and as such, is worthy of veneration even after death. This basic principle is applied in Orthodox liturgical services through the use of incense. During services, the priest first censens the holy sanctuary and the icons in order to honor God, His saints, and His holy house, which is considered sacred space. The priest then censens the congregation as living icons of God. This honor is continued after death during a funeral, by the censening of the deceased.

The Orthodox funeral service consists of the chanting of psalms and hymns dealing with man's final destiny. Many of the hymns speak of the mystery of death, thereby aiding us as we gaze upon the deceased trying to make sense of it all. The chanting of these hymns many times evoke mournful tears, which also serve as tears of healing for the bereaved. The hymns of the funeral service, however, always end on a positive note, evoking the mercy of God to bring the souls of our loved ones to eternal rest and salvation.

The entire experience of an Orthodox funeral service is one of simultaneous sorrow and joy. Our faith tradition

upholds that we who are left behind must see our loved ones in their state of repose. We must shed tears for them. We must gaze upon them and kiss them one last time, through the image that lies before us – their earthly body. Throughout our mourning, however, we are consoled by our belief in the immortality of the soul through Christ's Resurrection. The belief in life after death in a new realm of existence, gives us strength to move on. We leave funerals with the joyful expectation that we will be reunited again with our loved ones in the next world. This joyful expectation is the thrust behind the Orthodox custom of memorial services for the deceased, typically conducted at nine and forty days after death, and whenever desired on the anniversary of death. At these services, we are truly praying for the *living* who have “fallen asleep” in Christ.

In a practical sense, everything that happens at an Orthodox funeral definitely moves us toward a sense of closure. Any psychologist worth his salt will emphasize the importance of closure after a death, so that the bereaved can move forward with their lives. Thankfully, our Orthodox Church knows the importance of dealing with the pain of death from a spiritual standpoint. From the physical standpoint, God has granted us the gift of tears to aid us in dealing with anything difficult and painful in our lives. Thankfully, our Orthodox traditions surrounding funerals and memorial services not only bring us closure, but more importantly, inner strength through our fundamental belief in the Resurrection of our Lord, which has granted us eternal life.

FROM FR. ANTHONY

Fast of the Holy Apostles

Of the four major fast periods of the liturgical year, the fast of the Holy Apostles is the only one that can vary in length, specifically because it is dependent upon the date of Holy Pascha. Therefore, this fast can vary in length anywhere from several weeks to a few days, or even be non-existent on years with a very late Pascha. This year, the fast is only two weeks in length, from 6/16 through 6/28. As with all the fast periods of the year, it behooves us to participate in this holy fast period for our spiritual benefit.

This is not an overly strict fast, the guidelines being identical to the first part of the Nativity fast. For those who wish to follow per the traditional guidelines, we offer the following:

- No animal products permitted throughout (meat, poultry, eggs and dairy)
- Fish, wine and olive oil permitted daily, except for Wednesdays and Fridays
- Shellfish permitted daily

Following the Apostles Fast is a beautiful way of commemorating and reflecting on the sacrifices of these Holy Disciples and Apostles of Christ, especially Sts. Peter and Paul, who all together passed on our Orthodox Faith as received from the Lord and the Holy Spirit.

Questions & Answers

The following is taken from *The Orthodox Church: 455 Questions & Answers*, by Fr. Stanley Harakas; Light & Life Publishing Co., 1987.

Q. What happens to someone's soul after death according to the Orthodox Church, since we don't believe in purgatory?

A. The Orthodox Church explains the events following death in this manner. Theologically, death is the separation of the spiritual dimension of the human being (the soul or spirit), from the physical (the body). When we die, we begin immediately to experience a fore-taste of heaven or hell. That is, our spirits are either in communion with God, or they are not. This fore-taste experience, based on the general character of our lives regarding our behavior, character and communion with God, is known as the partial judgment. At some unknown time in the future, the Church teaches that Jesus Christ will return. Each Sunday we repeat our belief in the return of Christ when we say in the Creed: "And He shall come again in glory..." We also say in the Creed that when He returns, he will come "to judge the living and the dead." The creed also indicates what else will occur when Christ returns: "I expect the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come." Christ will bring an end to this world as we know it, and He will inaugurate a new era, establishing His kingdom, which "shall have no end." This final judgment is known as the general judgment. Our resurrected existence will then live eternally in heaven in communion with God, or eternally in hell, out of communion with God.

Q. If an Orthodox person marries outside our Church, is it true that he or she cannot receive Holy Communion for six years in the Orthodox Church?

A. I don't know where you received this idea, but it is only partially correct. An Orthodox Christian lives his or her life sacramentally united with the Church. One of the sacraments is holy matrimony. If an Orthodox Christian marries outside the Church (civilly or in another religious service), then he or she in effect causes a break between him, or herself and the Orthodox Church. As a result, such persons are no longer in full communion with the Church. The result is that they may not exercise the functions and full privileges of membership until the marriage is blessed with the Orthodox sacrament, not just for a period of six years. This means that, though still members of the Church, they are not in good order. Thus, they cannot properly receive Holy Communion, may not be sponsors at a wedding or baptism, or be elected to and serve as members or officers of the Church council.

Festival planning for 2025 is well underway! Wanted to say thank you to all our committee members who are participating and helping with the planning process this year.

We had the opportunity to speak at the May general assembly to talk about our needs for volunteers. Our festival keeps growing every year with the number of visitors and the amount raised, but our volunteer numbers have remained the same. Our volunteer subcommittee reported the following numbers from the 2024 festival:

- 107 total volunteers
- 83 people volunteered at least one 3-hour shift




