Beloved in Christ,

As we approach the fast of the Nativity of Christ, we begin to contemplate the awesome mystery of God becoming man in the flesh through our Savior Jesus Christ. What is equally awesome, is the contemplation of the divine gift given us, of having been created in the image and likeness of God. Let us explore what this truly means in our life according to the Church.

One of the major dogmatic teachings of the Orthodox Church, is that of the creation of man in God's image and likeness. Some Christians mistakenly interpret this teaching, erroneously believing that this simply means we somehow "look" like God. The fact of the matter is that being created in God's image and likeness has nothing to do with how we look, but instead, everything to do with the various divine gifts with which we've been endowed by the Creator.

In the Orthodox understanding of "image and likeness," besides the emphasis on free will and the ability to reason, there is also great emphasis on the role of mankind as having dominion over creation. As we are told in Genesis 1:26, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth." The Orthodox doctrine of "image and likeness" also presupposes a communal relationship of love between man and God, and love for the physical world because of its divine origin. How true we are to this divine call is clearly demonstrated by how well we care for the physical world, as well as how we interact with our fellow human beings.

When we review the history of mankind, we find countless examples of clear perversion of the divine call to live according to the image and likeness of God. Even though humans have done many good things upon the earth which have benefited mankind, as

well as the environment and the animal kingdom, there are also many unfortunate examples of abuse of our role as stewards of creation.

The most unfortunate situations are those which involve hatred and mistreatment of our fellow human beings. Knowing that we have been created in the image and likeness of God should allow us to discern the "stamp" of divinity within all human beings. Unfortunately, the power of evil takes hold of us and blinds our spiritual eyes, so that many times, ill feelings abound instead of love.

I remember hearing something striking at a clergy-laity congress of the Archdiocese, that was held a few years ago in Nashville, Tennessee. At the closing banquet, a Tennessee state senator spoke very openly about the ugly face of life in the South prior to the passing of the civil rights act. I was quite impressed to see a political figure openly express shame for those dark and terrible decades of oppression and segregation. As I listened, I thought to myself that this was a prime example of perverting the gift of being created in God's image and likeness.

Instead of mankind interacting with each other as loving stewards, reflecting God's unending love for His creation, often times we seek to control our fellow human beings through various evil means such as slavery, captivity, terrorism, sex trafficking, oppression, unjust wars, murder, crimes of hate, etc. Unfortunately, mankind has also learned to control human life within the womb through the abortion of living fetuses – an act which totally negates God's creative work.

In addition to trying to control others, mankind has also abused its God-given privileges by exploiting the environment for monetary gain. Many species of animals have become extinct or are near extinction, due to the greed of human beings. The de-forestation that has gone unchecked for centuries, has certainly taken its toll on the delicate

balance of nature.

Even though these crimes against the physical world are deplorable, crimes against our fellow human beings are infinitely worse, since we are the unique creation of God, created to share in His divinity. It is imperative, however, that we focus on the positive, and not dwell primarily on the negative. One can easily despair in mankind, feeling that there is a great gap that separates us from the Creator. This type of hopelessness leads to a dark, spiritual dead end.

As Orthodox Christians, we believe that Christ has bridged the gap between God and man, showing us how to live in a loving relationship with Him. Each one of us is a unique individual, created in His image and likeness. Individually, we have the potential to be true to our divine purpose, and to be shining examples to those around us. This is precisely how we Orthodox view the saints of the Church, who are our ideal examples and guides of living a holy life as God intended.

As we see more and more misery in the world, we should remind ourselves of the reason we were created, and how God desires that we treat each other and the physical world around us. If we are truly believers in the biblical doctrine of creation, then let us all do our part to live up to what God expects of us. A blessed Nativity Fast to all!

FROM FR. ANTHONY

Nativity Fast Begins 11/15

On November 15th, the Holy Orthodox Church begins its preparation for the Nativity of our Lord through a 40-day fast. The majority of this period is considered a relaxed fast, and not particularly strict until the final 12 days. Following are the generally accepted guidelines for the first part of the Nativity fast, for those who wish to follow it to the full extent.

From 11/15–12/12

- Fasting from all animal products. Shellfish may be consumed daily.
- Fish, wine (all alcoholic beverages), and olive oil may be consumed daily except for Wednesdays and Fridays (wine and olive oil are permitted on feasts of major saints - see Archdiocesan calendar).

Note: Fasting is always suspended for Thanksgiving Day per our Holy Archdiocese.

It behooves us to prepare ourselves spiritually for the Nativity of Our Lord by attempting to keep this fast to whatever extent possible (with the exception of course, of those with particular health concerns, and growing children). As with all fast periods of the Church, remember to incorporate regular church attendance, increased prayer, and charitable works. Holy Confession is also part of each fast season of the Church. I am always available for guidance, so please don't hesitate to ask!

From the Holy Fathers

The following is taken from the *Philokalia*, a collection of monastic wisdom popular throughout the Orthodox world.

Smoke from wood kindling a fire troubles the eyes; but then the fire gives them light and gladdens them. Similarly, unceasing attentiveness is irksome; but when, invoked in prayer, Jesus draws near, He illumines the heart; for remembrance of Him confers on us spiritual enlightenment and the highest of all blessings. (St. Philotheos of Sinai)

If God suffers in the flesh when He is made man, should we not rejoice when we suffer, for we have God to share our sufferings? This shared suffering confers the Kingdom on us. For he spoke truly who said, 'If we suffer with Him, then we shall also be glorified with Him' (Rom. 8:17). (St. Maximos the Confessor)

Godlessness and love of praise are the worst and most incurable disease of the soul and lead to her destruction. The desire for evil signifies a lack of what is good. Goodness consists in doing with all our heart whatever is right and pleasing to the God of all. (St. Anthony the Great)

Prayer is called a virtue, but in reality, it is the mother of the virtues; for it gives birth to them through union with Christ. (St. Mark the Ascetic)

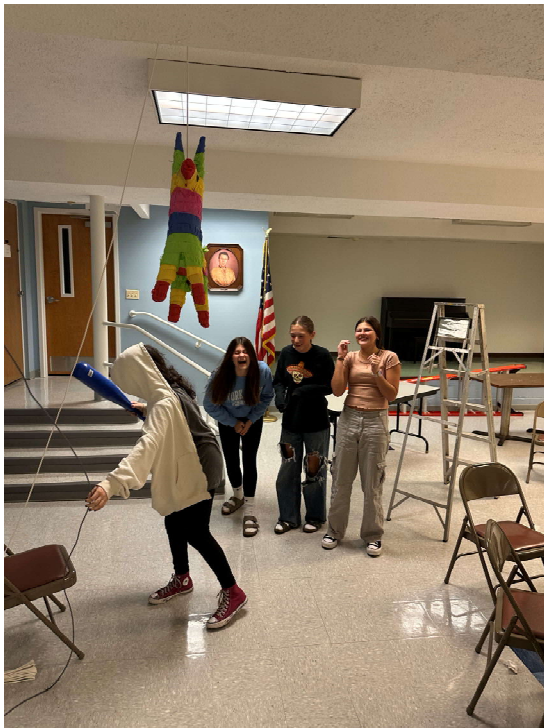

Outreach will be holding a TOILETRIES drive to support the Cross Roads House in Portsmouth, New Hampshire during the month of November.

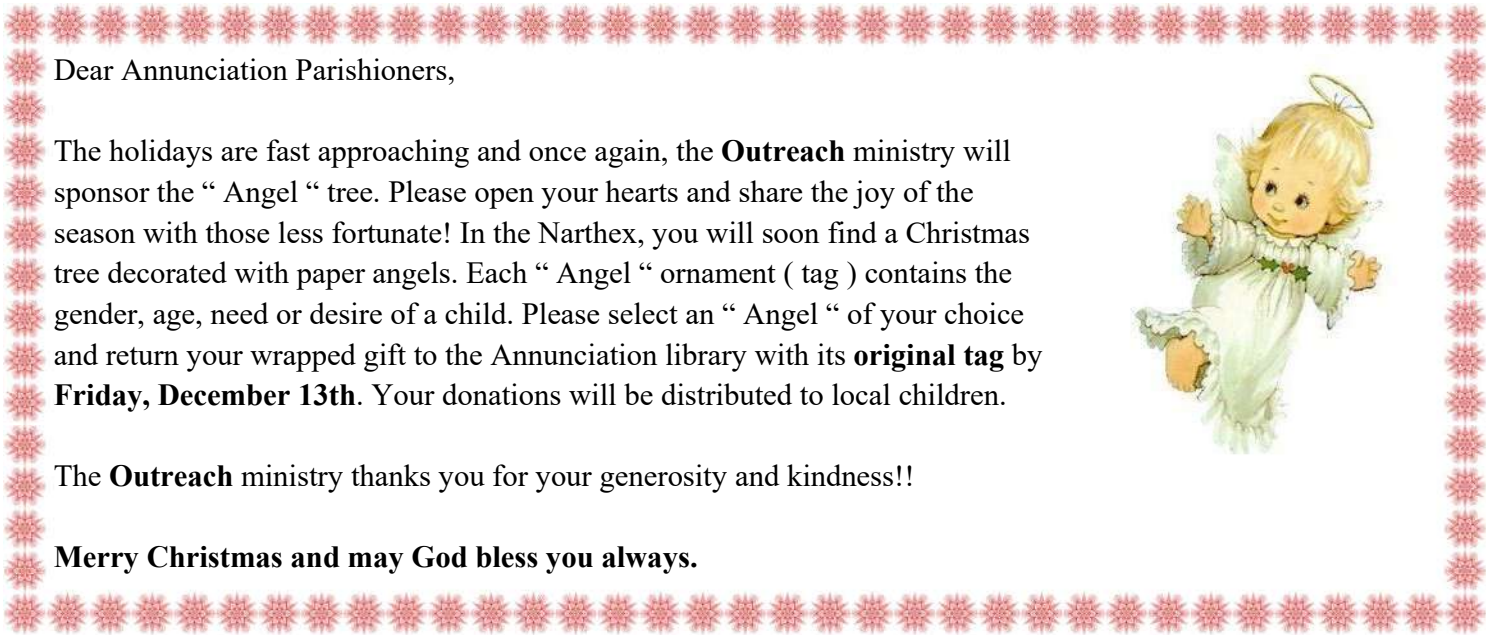
