Beloved in Christ,

Each September we make mention, in one way or another, of the beginning of the new ecclesiastical year on September 1 – the Church's "New Year's Day," if you will. Many parish priests use this opportunity to remind their flock of the importance of centering one's life around the Church; in other words, making Christ central in our Priests will speak of the importance of regular church attendance not the "hit or miss" approach. We will also bring to mind the importance and great blessing of celebrating the great feast days of the Church – the feasts of our Lord and the Theotokos, as well as those of many great saints and martyrs of our Church celebrated throughout the liturgical year. Being that our concern is the spiritual health and well-being of our flocks, we consistently bring these important spiritual issues to everyone's attention.

Sharing these annual "spiritual reminders" is really no different than our physicians constantly reminding us of important issues concerning our health and well-being – losing weight, exercising, eating nutritious and balanced meals, stopping smoking, drinking in moderation, etc., etc. They tell us these things because they *truly care* about seeing us stay healthy. How much more then, does the hospital of the soul – the Church of Christ – care about our *complete* well-being, starting with the soul?

This new ecclesiastical year, let us all try to become spiritually healthier through the life of the Church. To do this, we must first prioritize the health of the soul *over* the body. Those who are work-out fanatics wouldn't even consider missing a day at the gym, unless it was beyond their control. This is the approach an Orthodox Christian should have toward church attendance on all Sundays and major feasts days.

For those with children who wish to play sports on Sunday mornings, it is the parents' responsibility to set priorities in the home. Now, some may remark,

"what's so wrong with sports?" The point is that there is nothing wrong with healthy competition and exercise of the body through sports. The problem is that the secular world does not consider people's faith convictions and their Sunday obligations. Why not try to guide our children toward sporting activities that only occur on Saturdays, or at least Sunday afternoons? Why do we give in to our children's requests that interfere with Sunday church attendance? Remember, when raising children, it is *not* all about pleasing them 100% of the time. If we *consistently* bring them to church and keep the faith alive in the home, then we will have planted the correct seeds that will remain in them throughout their lives.

Regarding sporadic, or almost non-existent church attendance in general, many will say that even though they don't come to church often, they haven't forgotten about God; that they can pray to God anytime and anywhere; that they do not need to come to church to be close to God, among many other justifica-Here we must remind ourtions. selves that we are Orthodox Christians, who by definition do not espouse individualism and personalized theology with no accountability to the Body of Christ – the Church. Even though personal prayer throughout each day is an integral part of our spiritual lives, it cannot replace the liturgical worship experience. obligation as members of the Body of Christ, is to gather in worship of the living God on all Sundays as well as major feast days, as much as possible (with the exception of illness, mandatory work obligations, and other such hardships). We should seek sanctification and unity with God and one another, through frequent receipt of the holy mystery of the Eucharist, which is only possible by being part of the worshipping community of believers gathered in church.

In his book, *Liturgy and Life*, by Fr. Alexander Schmemann of blessed

memory (Orthodox Church in America, 1983), he says the following regarding Orthodox worship:

The Church as life and grace is realized through her worship. The Greek word for



worship - 'leiturgia' - means more than common prayer: it means corporate action, in which everyone takes an active part, is a participant and not only an 'attendant.' The nature of this action is both corporate and per-<u>sonal</u>. It is <u>corporate</u> because through the unity and faith of its participants it realizes and fulfills the reality of Church, i.e. the presence of Christ among those who believe in Him. It is personal because this reality is every time conveyed to me, given me for my personal edification, for my own growth in grace. Thus, in worship I am both an active 'builder' of the Church – and to be this is my Christian duty – and I am also its 'beneficiary' – for the whole of the Church's treasure is offered to me, is a Divine gift to me.

Beloved in Christ, please accept all the above as a loving invitation into the life of grace and spiritual fulfillment in Christ, and not as an admonition. We can leave our doctor's office upset after hearing his/her words of warning, but the reality is that the future health of our body remains questionable at best, if we choose to ignore our physician's guidance. May we begin this new ecclesiastical year on a positive note by being honest with ourselves, and seek to continually grow in Christ. With our eternal destiny directly affected by our life in the Church, one should clearly understand the priority of the matter at hand!

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FROM FR. ANTHONY

Reflections on the Feast of the Holy Cross

The following is taken from *The Year of Grace of the Lord*, by a Monk of the Eastern Church, St. Vladimir's Seminary Press, 1992.

Let us look beyond the wood of the cross, and concentrate on all that is spiritual and eternal in the very idea of the cross of Jesus...St. Paul says that a Christian does not know how to glorify himself 'save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world'. In the gospel (John 5:13-17) we read: 'As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life'.

As the feast of the Cross draws near, it is not useless to remember that the cross which it concerns is the cross on which Jesus Christ was crucified for our salvation. The decision to 'bear our cross' – which is so deeply evangelical, and without which this feast of the Cross would somehow remain an abstract idea – is an essential aspect, though a secondary one, of the mystery of the cross. The principal aspect, is that we are saved by the Passion of Jesus...The feasts of the Cross give us an opportunity to meditate on what the Blood of Christ means in our spiritual life, on the death of the Saviour as a reparation for our sins, and on the relationship between the cross and love. They are precious as an opportunity for us to deepen our understanding of that article in the Nicene creed when we confess that Jesus died 'for us men and for our salvation'...

Three of the chants for this day call specially for our attention. While the congregation kisses the cross, the choir sings: 'We fall down before Thy Cross, O Master, and we praise Thy holy Resurrection'. The Church is concerned never to dissociate the cross from the tomb, the crucifixion from the resurrection, death from life. The grief of Holy Friday ends in the joy of Easter. Another chant connects the elevation of Christ on the cross and the shining forth of divine light: 'The light of Thy countenance, O Lord, spreads out over us'...Finally, another chant associates Mary with the cross. For Mary is the 'mysterious paradise' in whom was brought about the growth of Christ, and Christ himself 'planted on earth the life-giving tree of the cross'...

Each one of us must take up his own cross; not the cross of his choice, but the cross — that is to say the portion of suffering and trial — that God has assigned to him especially, and which is one of the aspects of the cross of Jesus himself. In the feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, let us exalt and enthrone in our heart the cross of Jesus, let us apply to the Passion of our Lord, and even to our poor efforts (which are our share in the Passion) this saying, through which the mystery of the cross receives its highest and most complete interpretation: 'Greater love hath no man that this, that a man lay down his life...'

From the Writings of the Saints

The following is taken from a collection of sacred poetry by St. Ephraim the Syrian, collectively known as *Hymns on Paradise*.

HYMN II

- 1. Blessed is he for whom Paradise yearns. Yes, Paradise yearns for the man whose goodness makes him beautiful; it engulfs him at its gateway, it embraces him in its bosom, it caresses him in its very womb; for it splits open and receives him into its inmost parts. But if there is someone it abhors, it removes him and casts him out; this is the gate of testing that belongs to Him who loves mankind.
- 3. When people see that they have lost everything, that riches do not endure and carnal desires no longer exist, that beauty and power disappear and vanish, then they recollect themselves and are filled with remorse, because, choked with care, they heard with contempt those words, 'Your possessions are but a passing dream, your inheritance, darkness.'
- 5. The righteous, too, perceive that their own affliction no longer exists, their suffering does not endure, their burden no longer remains, and it seems as if no anguish had ever assailed them. Their fasts appear as though a mere dream, for they have woken as it were from sleep to discover Paradise and the Kingdom's table spread out before them
- **6.** By those who are outside, the summit cannot be scaled, but from inside, Paradise inclines its whole self to all who ascend it; the whole of its interior gazes upon the just with joy. Paradise girds the loins of the world, encircling the great sea; neighbor to the beings on high, friendly to those within it, hostile to those without.


