Beloved in Christ,

As you well know, September 1st is the annual commencement of the new ecclesiastical year. Each ecclesiastical year is a repetition of our annual spiritual journey toward Holy Pascha, which is the liturgical climax of the year. After Pascha, we prepare for the great feasts of the Ascension and Pentecost, and in the midst of the summer months, we celebrate both the Transfiguration of Christ and Dormition of the Holy Theotokos, bringing us to the end of the ecclesiastical year on 8/31. Soon after entering the new liturgical year, we encounter two major feast days – the Nativity of the Theotokos on 9/8, and the Universal Elevation of the Holy Cross on 9/14. Each year we relive our salvation history liturgically, as presented by our Holy Orthodox Church. As we enter the new ecclesiastical year, let us pick up our own crosses if we have spiritually laid them aside, and begin a new journey following Christ toward Golgotha, the Tomb, and life eternal.

So just what do we mean by taking up our cross and following the Lord? Let us begin by reflecting on what Holy Scripture says about this: And he who does not take his cross and follow after Me is not worthy of Me. (Mt 10-38). Whoever desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me. (Mk 8:34). In the first passage from Matthew, we see an emphasis on worthiness. To follow Christ, we must be worthy of Him. There must exist within us both *humility* and obedience, in order to accept his divine command to follow Him. Obviously, following Christ is a life-long calling – not something approached superficially.

In the second quote from Mark, the emphasis is on *self-denial*. We can't truly follow Christ if we are married to

the things of this world. To follow Christ, one must continually have one's eye on the goal of eternal life, while simultaneously living a sacrificial life to Christ while on the journey to the Kingdom. To carry one's cross in the Christian sense, is to share in the sufferings of Christ. Whatever we have to deal with in this life is by the will of God, and for our spiritual benefit, even though that may not be clear to us. The carrying of our cross is not meant to be *punitive*, but *salvific*, for Christ never seeks to destroy and punish His children, but to bring them to salvation in His Kingdom.

Another important aspect of carrying one's cross in imitation of Christ, is that the Holy Cross of Christ is the destroyer of passions. As a weapon of great spiritual benefit, we must take up our cross in order to fight the enemy of souls – Satan and his host of demons who hate mankind, and wish to see us lose our way on the journey toward salvation. Hear the beautiful words of the *exaposteilarion* hymn from the feast of the Holy Cross:

The Cross is the guardian of the whole world; the Cross is the support and staff of the faithful; the Cross is the beauty of the Church of Christ; the Cross is the mighty strength of kings; the Cross is the glory of Angels; it is the wounding of demons.

Beloved in Christ, with God on our side we have nothing to fear. This is why it is important to carry the cross in life that Christ gave us, and to follow *Him*, our Lord and Savior. If we constantly pick up other symbols of this world and not our cross, how can we expect the Lord to be there for us, and to guide us along the straight and narrow path toward salvation? We may think that it is too difficult to

bear the cross God gave us; that it is just too heavy a burden, so we simply put it down, so to speak, and begin following other paths in life. I would like to



share a short quote that has been circulating in the recent past, which beautifully sums up the perceived difficulty of many regarding bearing one's cross:

A young monk had been struggling in the spiritual life. His cross, he thought, was too heavy, too difficult to bear. He complained about it endlessly. One night he had a dream. God came to him in this dream and said, 'Come, if this is too hard, choose a new cross to carry.'

The monk walked into a room filled with crosses (imagine that room of chalices from 'Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade'). He looked around for a while—many were huge, some were metal, some wooden and carved, some had nails sticking out from their cross beams, some were even covered in blood. He was taken aback. He looked around, sizing them up, mentally comparing their weight. Finally, he found it — the perfect little cross tucked away in a corner. It was silver, finely carved, and he picked it up easily. 'I found one,' he called out.

God simply replied, 'But that's the cross you came here with.'

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FROM FR. ANTHONY

From the Holy Fathers

The following is taken from *The Life in Christ*, by St. Nicholas Cabasilas, SVS Press 1974.

1. How the Life in Christ Begins in This Life

The life in Christ originates in this life and arises from it. It is perfected, however, in the life to come, when we shall have reached that last day. It cannot attain perfection in men's souls in this life, nor even in that which is to come without already having begun here...But if the life to come were to admit those who lack the faculties and senses necessary for it, it would avail nothing for their happiness, but they would be dead and miserable living in that blessed and immortal world.

Now, it is possible for the Son of God to make His friends to share in His mysteries in preparation for that day, and for them to learn from Him what He has heard from the Father (Jn. 15:15). But they must come as His friends who 'have ears to hear' (Mt. 11:15)...Those, then, who have not acquired these things before they departed have nothing in common with that life. To this the five foolish virgins and the man invited to the wedding feast are witnesses, since they came without either the oil or the wedding garment and were not able to buy them then.

2. The Life in Christ Consists of Union with Him

In short, it is this world which is in travail with that new inner man which is 'created after the likeness of God' (Eph. 4:24). When he has been shaped and formed here he is thus born perfect into that perfect world which grows not old. As nature prepares the fetus, while it is in its dark and fluid life, for that life which is in the light, and shapes it, as though according to a model, for the life which it is about to receive, so likewise it happens to the saints... However, while the unborn have no perception whatever of this life, the blessed ones have many hints in this present life of things to come.

In this present world, therefore, it is possible for the saints not only to be disposed and prepared for that life, but also even now to live and act in accordance with it... Yet the Lord did not promise merely to be present with the saints, but to abide with them – nay more than this, to make His abode in them (Jn. 14:23)... As Paul says, 'he who is united to the Lord becomes one spirit with Him' (I Cor. 6:17), and 'that you may be one body and one spirit, just as you were called' (Eph. 4:4).

From the Hymnody of Our Church

Selections from the Feast of the Nativity of the Theotokos, 9/8:

God who abides amid heavenly thrones, today prepares for Himself a holy throne on earth. He who in wisdom made firm the heavens, has out of love fashioned a living heaven. For out of a barren root, He has brought forth His own Mother, a life-giving plant. God of wonders and hope of the hopeless, glory to You. (from the stichera of Great Vespers)

This is the day of the Lord; peoples rejoice. Behold, the bridal chamber of light; the book of the word of life, emerges from the womb. And the gate to the East opens to await the entrance of the Great High Priest. That alone is the gateway which brings Christ into the world for the salvation of our souls. (the doxastikon of Orthros)

Selections from the feast of the Holy Cross, 9/14:

Rejoice, life-creating Cross, invincible banner of faith, gateway to Paradise, support of the faithful, rampart of the Church, by which death was abolished and its power swallowed up, while we were raised up from earth to the heavens. You are the unconquerable weapon, the adversary of demons, the glory of Martyrs and pride of Saints, the haven of salvation, granting the world great mercy. (from the aposticha of Great Vespers)


We venerate the wood of Your Cross, O Lover of Man, for You, the Life of all, were nailed to it. O Savior, You opened Paradise to the Robber who approached You with faith. He was counted worthy of delight, confessing to You, 'Remember me, O Lord.' Accept us as You accepted him, for we now cry, we all have sinned against Your compassion. Do not abandon us. (from the kathismata of Orthros)

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
